

What Did We Learn?

- Physical separation from traffic is key:
 - 35% are only comfortable walking or biking on quiet streets or on trails, away from traffic.
 - 42% are ok walking or biking near busy streets, but prefer physical separation.
 - Only 2% are comfortable biking on almost any road without bike lanes or wide shoulders.
- Walkability to schools should be a primary focus, with a secondary focus on parks.
- Some areas are lacking sidewalks or in need of repair and maintenance.
- · Connectivity between walking and biking routes is critical.
- Improvements to bus service (e.g. running buses on Sunday) and bus stops are desired.
- Better lighting is a significant need, along trails, and along walking routes to schools.
- Traffic speeds and reckless driving is a major concern for people riding bikes.
- Potholes are a concern for people driving and cycling.

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
